Trees Adopted by Boonah Community

Chris Bowman loves trees. You may be familiar with Chris as a driving force behind efforts to save the trees in High Street last year. Saving trees is one thing, but Chris is also behind efforts to plant trees in our community.

Chris and a small group of friends joined forces with Boonah and District Landcare late last year to create an avenue of native trees from Bruckner Hill to the Boonah Golf Club.

Part of the vision was to involve community members who would adopt, plant and care for 4 trees each. This was to increase the chance of survival in what can be harsh conditions in Boonah—hot summers, winter frosts, the occasional flood and all too familiar droughts.

After much paperwork, and with the support of Boonah and District Landcare, Scenic Rim Regional Council approved the project just in time to plant on the proposed planting date. Our local Landcare Group provided funding for a Risk Assessment from Customised Traffic Management as well as tree guards, stakes and people power.

It was wonderful to see a good turn out of Landcarers and Adopters on 28th March to complete Stage One of the planting.

International Day of Forests Movie Night

Eighty people attended a movie night hosted by Boonah and District Landcare to celebrate International Day of Forests at the Cultural Centre in Boonah. The Bob Brown Foundation documentary, *Forest Defenders*, highlighted the lengths to which environmentalists are going to protect native forests and wildlife habitat in Tasmania. The second documentary, *Rediscovering the Country*, focused on the revegetation of

farming land that was cleared in Victoria in the middle of last century. The project is based on a successful model from Sri Lanka and provided hope for the future.

Local Weed Information for Locals

Locals will soon have access to information about priority weeds in Boonah and District. A double-sided, A3 information page, highlighting local problem weeds, will soon be available to use in conjunction with the Weed Society's publication *Weeds of Southern Queensland*.

Thomas Bell and Linda Kimber from Boonah and District Landcare have been working with staff from Scenic Rim Regional Council to develop this resource which will also include strategies to approach weed management and weed management techniques. Scenic Rim Regional Council will assist in launching this project by providing funding to conduct a half-day workshop on Weed Identification and Management. The workshop is planned for mid-year so keep an eye out for details of contact Boonah and District Landcare by email (see address below).

Weeds can have a devastating effect on the environment and on agricultural production. Whether we live in town or on acreage, weed management is an ongoing task.
